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


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Get hitched to these wedding trends

 Flower seeds or seedlings: Sustainable gifts such as flower seeds or small seedlings can let guests plant something as a remembrance of the day.

• Scratch-off lottery tickets: The opportunity to return home from a wedding with a winning ticket and a few extra dollars in their pockets can appeal to guests.

• Charitable donation: Rather than giving guests favors, you may want to offer donations to a charity instead. This is a popular gesture among modern couples.



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CELEBRATE YOUR BIG DAY AT Staller Estate Winery

Winery hosts variety of events including bridal showers, weddings by Sandra Landen Machaj

Located on County Highway A near Delavan, Elkhorn and Whitewater, Staller Estate Winery stands out with its bright red buildings and beautifully tended grape vines.

Tables and chairs sit under a large pergola, with the bright green vines adding color and warm to the space. Originally an old dairy farm, Joe and Wendy Staller purchased the space more than 10 years ago with the plan to turn it into a vineyard and winery – a venture that has been a success.

Wine making had been a hobby since the couple's college days at the University of Wisconsin-Whitewater.

Wendy was so interested in learning more about wine that, after graduating from UW-Whitewater, she attended the University of California-Davis to complete a wine program, becoming knowledgeable about all aspects of wine making.

The business has taken off, turning the dairy farm into the vineyard much quicker than planned.

"It was a hobby that grew out of control and is now a full-time business," Wendy said. "We began with a small vineyard and then began to increase the number of vines. We now have three acres of grapes growing near the winery and another acre up on the hill."


As the vines began to produce, the couple started to experiment with a variety of wines – reds, whites, sweet wines and dry wines until there was a good line of wines. The couple began entering the wines into contests, often winning awards, and as they found an audience for the wines, they began tastings at the winery.

When more and more visitors came to the vineyard, the two began to add even more services.

Ideal for many events

"We now hold a variety of different events here throughout the seasons," Wendy said. "Bachelorette parties, bridal showers, baby showers, special birthday or anniversary events and even small

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weddings can be arranged."

Both ample indoor and outdoor space is available, making the venue an option any time of the year.

A favorite activity for bachelorette parties and bridal showers is to hold a wine tasting out in the vineyards. A long table to fit the number of guests is set up between two rows of the vines, offering some privacy while still being outdoors. Green grapevines – and depending on the timing, potentially ripe grapes – can add to the ambience.

Bachelorette parties often include a wine tasting and the sharing of a charcuterie board or a picnic platter. As charcuterie boards have become more popular, various sizes and kinds have been added to the menu at Staller. A variety of meats, cheeses, olives, nuts, dried fruits, a special olive blend and fig preserves, as well as freshly baked French baguette bread are available, with the cheese chosen by the customer from many local cheeses.

If being outside in the vineyard is not where you want to be, there are several other options from indoors in the sunroom to the gazebo or in the newer Barrel Cellar Room. The sunroom is bright and cheerful as is the gazebo.

The Barrel Room has a very different vibe. Located on the lower level, it is a true wine cellar. With large wooden barrels and racks of wine, it's a bit darker and more intimate.

The Cellar Experience is a special event for two people. Visit the website to learn more about the Cellar Experience. Because it is a true wine cellar and the temperature is true cellar temp between 55 and 60 degrees, so guests should dress appropriately.

In addition to the intimate Cellar Experience, the cellar can be used for other events, holding up to 40 guests comfortably. As with other venues, reservations for special parties need to be made as far in advance as possible.

"We do hold weddings at Staller's Estate Winery," said Wendy. "We have had couples schedule their wedding ceremony out in the vineyard and then move to the Cellar for their reception."

She explained that Staller does not provide food for weddings, but couples can use a caterer of their choice.

Products honored

In addition to the award-winning wines the couple has produced, Staller also creates vodka, cognac, brandy and a liqueur that tastes similar to Grand Marnier.

Last year they entered their brandy into the Finger Lakes International Competition.

"It was awarded the 2024 Gold medal and was also awarded best of class," Wendy explained. "We sell the brandy bottled and we have also bottled our

Wisconsin Old Fashioned, made with our brandy. It is available in our gift shop and also is on our cocktail menu."

It's not just private parties that gather at the winery. On any given day, you may find friends getting together for a short afternoon visit and enjoying a small table outside in the vineyards or under the pergola, while they enjoy a glass of wine, or a tasting accompanied with an item from the food menu.

"Private tastings can also be scheduled on most days," Wendy said. "You can pair your wine tasting with chocolate flights, cheese wheels or a picnic platter."

The chocolate flight pairs a different chocolate with each wine sample. Wendy shares her knowledge of wines during the private tastings, making it not just a pleasant social event but a learning opportunity as well.

Staller Estate also serves a variety of cocktails created with liquor from their own distillery. Among the options are Wisconsin Old Fashioned, traditional Old Fashioned, New York Sour, Bloody Mary, Lavender Lemon Drop, Pomegranate Tonic and Cranberry Sour.

Staller offers flatbreads on Fridays and Sundays. The menu lists these options for flatbreads: 3 Cheese, Meat Lovers, Morchella or Maple Bourbon Dessert.

Special offerings

There is a seasonal menu available at Staller, which features any variety of drinks such as the Purple Dragon Fruit Mojito. And of course there are nonalcoholic offerings available for those who prefer them.

"All the syrups used in these cocktails are created by hand on site," Wendy explained. "We also offer cocktail classes on a monthly basis."

Call and register for a class, learn all about creating perfect and unique cocktails and become the cocktail expert for your next family or friends gathering.

"Another new event that has been added is our Bingo games," Wendy said. "We have been holding them about every other month, on Saturday or Sunday afternoons. Check the website for dates."

Although one of the first pictures to come to mind when one envisions a wedding dress may be a floor-length gown, mini dresses continue to make bold statements on bridal runways and in magazines.

The abbreviated hemlines can be flirty and fun, and are featured on various types of dresses, including fitted, strapless, flowing, and even puffed styles.

Jacquard and other opulent materials


Lace long has been a bridal dress staple, but designers are branching out into other fabrics that lend luxury and opulence to dresses.

Texture can make a wedding dress a unique visual during ceremonies and the after-party and may help a bride feel like royalty.

Pearls and more pearls

Pearl necklaces and other jewelry has long gone hand-in-hand with weddings, but brides-to-be can now find pearls turning up just about anywhere.

Pearls are embroidered onto dresses, veils, sleeves, and headpieces, and even can be used on wedding cakes to mirror a pearl aesthetic used elsewhere.



Bows

Along with pearls, a growing number of designers are opting for bows in their wedding dress designs.

They may be subtle, such as stitched onto the bodice of the dress, or more overthe-top, like a huge bow at the waist or near the train bustle, according to One Fab Day.

Shimmer and sparkle

A little bling (or a lot) never goes out of style. In recent years, many brides have embraced even more shimmer and sparkle as silver takes center stage in dress designs. Silver thread embroidery or even mirrortype embellishments will ensure all eyes are on the bride when she makes her entrance.

Overskirts

Many brides want a dramatically shaped dress for the ceremony, only to pare down a bit for the reception. The style experts at Vogue note an overskirt provides the flexibility to easily remove layers of fabric to unveil a more fitted silhouette.

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A wedding is a magical and memorable day for a couple and their family members and friends. Months or even years of planning may go into making a wedding day special.

For some, an outdoor wedding and celebration amid the beauty of nature is the ultimate setting in which to tie the knot. When Mother Nature is your decorator, the setting can be hard to match. Perhaps that's why 62% of couples opted for outdoor nuptials in a recent year, according to The Knot Real Weddings Survey.

However, there may be some extra work involved when exchanging vows outdoors, hosting a reception outside, or both. That work includes having a contingency plan in place if the weather does not cooperate.

Here's what couples should know about having a backup plan for their outdoor weddings.

• Identify a second location. Couples who book outdoor receptions at catering halls can inquire how they handle inclement weather. Many will have a clause built into the agreement to move the party indoors in the event of bad weather. Others may enable the wedding to move to a different space for an added fee. Smaller, less formal weddings taking place at other locations may require a bit of ingenuity when looking for a backup space. Perhaps a friend has a large house where everyone can gather, or an employer may have a warehouse, loft, or even a barn that can be transformed into unique venues at the last minute.

• Choose outdoor spaces with covered areas. The wish might be to have blue skies overhead, but it's impossible to control the weather. So it's a safer bet to select outdoor spaces that offer a measure of weather protection, such as a pavilion in a park or a covered deck at a beachside locale.

These types of sites offer a little security without detracting from the ambiance.

• Look into a tent rental. A tent is a great investment because it keeps everyone out of the elements rain or shine. Even on a lovely summer day, the blazing sun can make being outdoors uncomfortable. A tent is the solution.

Couples should coordinate with a wedding planner or the venue itself to be sure that a tent is allowed on the grounds.

• Think about event insurance. Special event insurance may protect against financial loss in the event that severe weather throws a wrench into outdoor wedding plans.

Poor weather may make moving around the venue treacherous and might force a postponement. Liability and cancellation protection in an insurance policy helps couples avoid financial hardship.

• Hire a wedding planner. The Knot suggests hiring a wedding planner or coordinator who can pivot to Plan B in the event of bad weather.

This can also help take some of the stress off of the couple and others in the wedding party so they can enjoy the day.

• Plan wardrobe and hair and makeup accordingly. Brides and bridesmaids can choose fabrics for dresses that will be comfortable and not become blown around or see-through due to rain and wind.

The wedding party can ask hair stylists to create a wedding hairstyle that is somewhat weatherproof.

Experienced makeup artists likely know some tricks to keep makeup looking flawless even when the weather isn't.

is particularly true for couples who will be having ceremonies customized to their own beliefs and relationship histories.

Writing vows enables the soonto-be betrothed to be creative, personal and speak from the heart. However, when faced with writing sentiments that will be expressed in front of others, nerves can set in.

crime, confidante, or all of the above?

• Be sure to say, "I love you" in the vows – Many couples get so hung up on language that they may forget these most basic words at the heart of the wedding.

• Gush about all of the reasons for that love – Offer personal stories, anecdotes or something that will illustrate to the crowd why you want to spend your life with this person.

• Look to the future – Think about how you want to spend the years ahead. Paint a picture of what you envision your lives will look like, whether that includes children, traveling the globe, or other ideas.

• Make promises to one another – Vows are essentially promises, so come up with some you agree to abide by. These can include similar sentiments to ones that are shared in traditional weddings, or clever and humorous promises, such as to do the dishes, or pick up clothes from the bedroom floor.

• Include stories that point out your collective strengths and weaknesses – Don't forget to mention instances when things were tough and how you overcame them, and how you can use these lessons in your future as a married couple.

Once the big day has passed, there will be no opportunity to go back and arrange missed shots.

This list of must-have photos can ensure that the wedding album has all the shots most couples desire.
