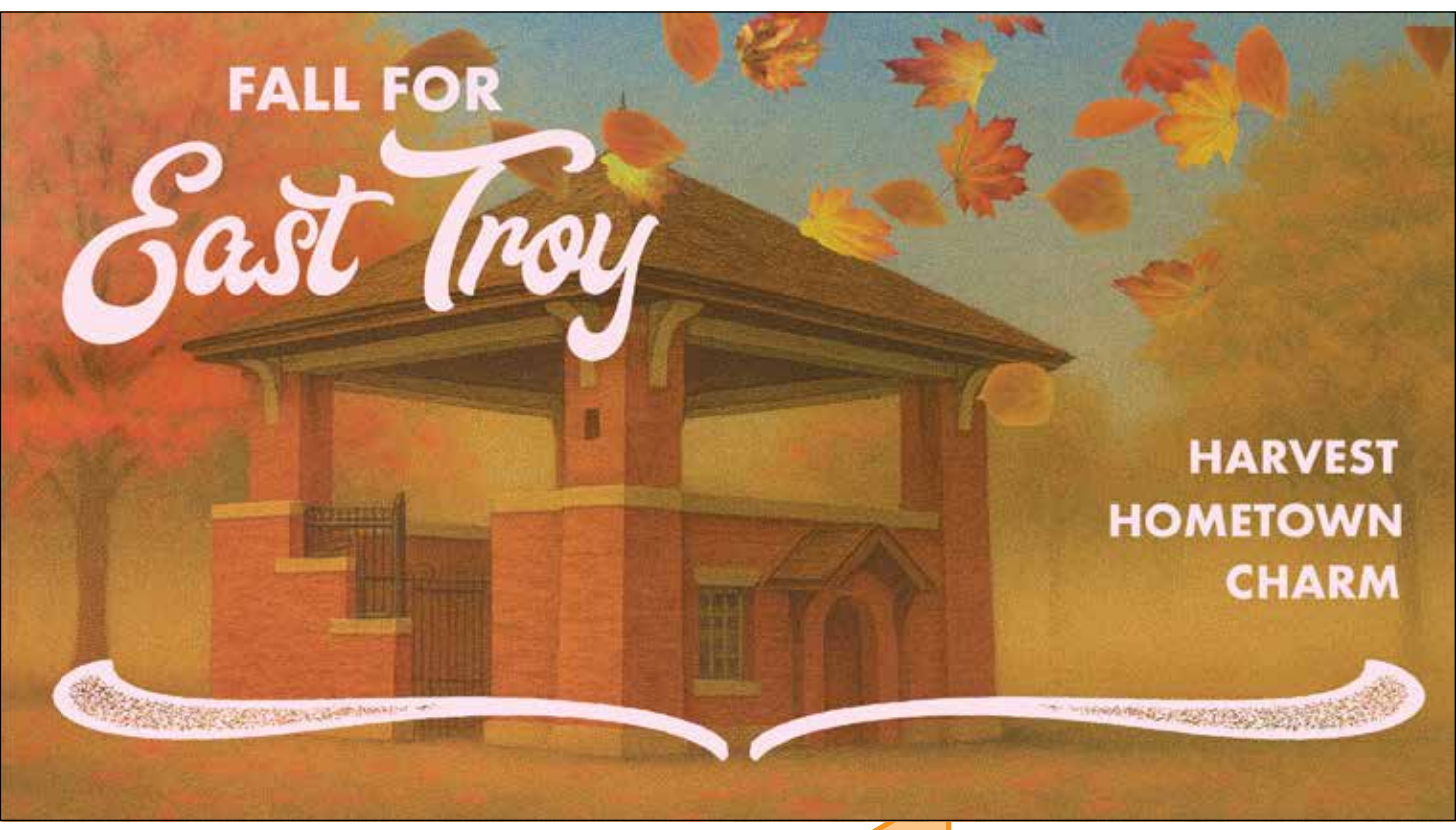

New owners take helm at East Troy Brewery, eye expanded community role

East Troy Brewery, a staple on the East Troy Square since December of 2018, has new owners who say they're committed to honoring its roots while adding fresh ideas to keep patrons coming back for more. Business partners Lance Rosenmayer and Sasha Sekulich officially took over the brewery in May of 2025, bringing with them decades of business experience and a shared vision for creating a destination that blends seamlessly with the square's energy.

"We want this place to be an experience," Rosenmayer said. "People should leave saying, 'Wow, that was fun. We want to go back.'"

Rosenmayer, who spent 30 years in his family's construction business before retiring to East Troy seven years ago, said the opportunity to purchase the brewery reignited his entrepreneurial spirit.

"After years of being retired, I was excited to take something this special and bring it to the next level," he said.

Sekulich, who spent 15 years in business development after running his own company, agreed.

"When Lance suggested buying this beautiful building in this great location, I was all in," he said. "It's such an exciting new venture."

Both men were regular customers from the brewery's opening in December 2018 and watched it navigate challenges, including COVID-era restrictions and three rounds of East Troy road construction/closures. They credit former majority owners Ann and Ted Zess with creating a vibrant space despite those hurdles.

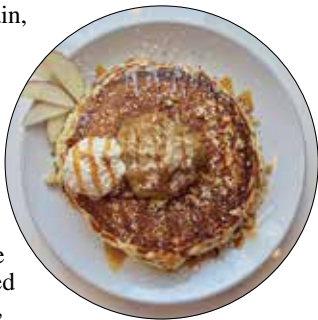
CARAMEL APPLE PANCAKES

“The square is what drew us here,” Rosenmayer said. “The building’s details are amazing, and now we are here full-time to focus on taking it even further.”

Community First

Rosenmayer and Sekulich said they have spent their first months listening to customers, previous investors and community members.

Feedback has guided a 21-item action plan that focuses on service quality, food and beverage consistency, and community engagement.

“We always say culture first, service second, experience third,” Rosenmayer said. “Our culture is about community and environment. If we get that right, everything else will follow.”

Following the Zesses’ example (both have a long history of giving back in East Troy), Rosenmayer and Sekulich said their team plans to stay involved in the community and will continue the brewery’s presence at events like the East Troy Area Chamber of Commerce’s Brewfest, as well as additional business collaborations.

What’s New

While popular menu items such as Hill Valley Dairy cheese curds and Crispy Brussel Sprouts will remain, the owners are working with Executive Chef Nathan Dettinger on seasonal specials, beer pairings and a new Monday Night Supper Club menu. They also plan to bring back fan favorites like cauliflower wings to the brewery’s menu, which features tasty options for the whole family.

“We are working with our chef to create new things and are just letting him be creative,” said Sekulich.

Rosenmayer and Sekulich said customers will not be disappointed with the kitchen’s rotating lineup of stellar menu items.

“We’re focusing on quality – of the service, the food and the beer,” said Sekulich.

Head Brewer Patrick Miller will continue leading the brewery’s beer program, with plans to introduce more light lagers, including the popular Midwest Currency, a crispy clean

Rosenmayer and Sekulich plan to work with Pat to keep East Troy Brewery a first-class beer venue, creating a hub for craft beer fans.

Whether it’s collaborating with other breweries on a new recipe or churning out ales, sours and stouts that attract beer snobs from near and far, Pat said the goal remains “to share what we love doing with our community.”

Distribution is also expanding in a big way, with the brewery’s products now in 13 locations, up

from three, and more coming soon in Lake Geneva, Delavan and additional area venues to increase brand exposure.

Facility improvements are in the way, including noise reduction features, frame TVs that transform from art displays to big screens for the big game, expanded hours and a new private dining experience. Cosmetic updates to the building’s exterior and outdoor enhancements are also on the horizon.

A Community Hub

The brewery will continue hosting live music every Friday and Saturday night, themed events such as bicycle nights, trivia, karaoke, as well as private gatherings and special occasions.

“To us, bringing more people to the square benefits all of us,” Sekulich said. “We want this to be a place locals are proud of – a hub for the community.”

The Beginning

East Troy Brewery opened in 2018 after Ann and Ted Zess purchased and renovated the historic 1892 State Bank of East Troy building on the Village Square. The transformed 6,000-square-foot space was the first of its kind in Walworth County, featuring a 10-barrel brewhouse, a full restaurant serving from-scratch Wisconsin pub fare and an expansive patio.

Since opening its doors, it has remained a popular stop for both residents and visitors, helping fuel the momentum of East Troy’s growing downtown.

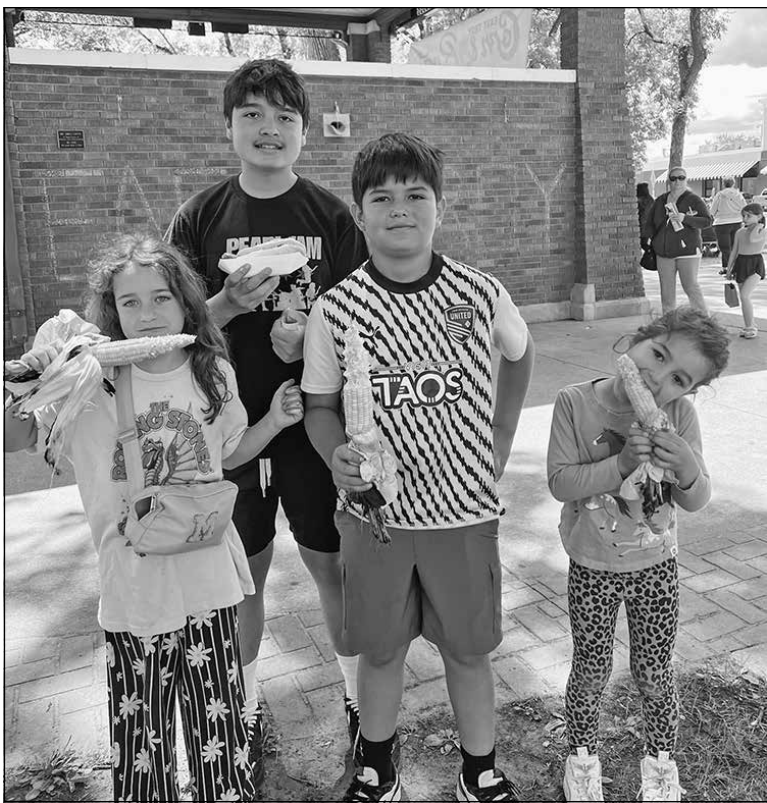

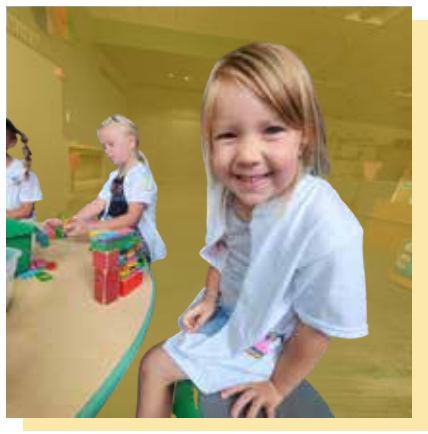
